War Memorials Project Update

Blackfordby Unveils New War Memorial

On 27th October, a new WW1 and WW2 memorial was unveiled in the village of Blackfordby, near Ashby in Northwest Leicestershire. It is located near to the ancient village spring, and was dedicated by Bishop Christopher. The memorial takes the form of a stone obelisk with inscribed plaques on its base, and was designed and made by Andy Oldfield of The Fringe Workshop in Derbyshire. Space has also been allowed for memorial wooden crosses to be planted nearby. Local school children each left a cross with a name from the war memorial. An exhibition based on wartime Blackfordby and its casualties was held in the Methodist Church (which itself contains a war memorial plaque and roll of honour). Blackfordby's Church of England church also has a war memorial clock in the tower. The new memorial was funded locally, the project receiving support from Ashby Town Council,



Ashby Museum, and the local branch of the Royal British Legion.

The new War Memorials Project website <u>www.leicestershirewarmemorials.co.uk</u> has been receiving contact from the public in record numbers. The new site is more visible in search engines, so people from across the UK and around the world are finding our records for their relatives.

The great news for us is that we are both able to provide information to enquirers, and are receiving it too – like this photograph of George Webb, who is commemorated on the Dunton Bassett war memorial after being killed in 1915 while in the Leicestershire Regiment. This was sent in by Tim Brown.

Century of Stories Update



The project has now been running for 3 months and we are delighted with the response we have had from groups and individuals from all around Leicestershire.

Following on from the History cafes we have over 20 participants who are now researching their story with help from our senior research Buddy, John Sutton from the Western Front Association. These stories range from prisoners of war to reserved occupations.

We are beginning a Community project in Ellistown early next year which will be an intergenerational project hosted at Ellistown primary school.



Our groups of adults with learning disabilities have been very busy making poppies and are writing letters and Christmas cards to the soldiers on the Western Front.
